<b>Brief description</b>	<p><i>Growing Up in Ireland</i> (GUI) is a national longitudinal study of children being conducted with the aim of improving understanding of all aspects of children's lives and their development in the current social, economic and cultural environment. The principal objective of the GUI study is to describe the lives of children in order to establish what is typical and normal, as well as what is atypical and problematic. This information will be used to assist in policy formation and in the provision of services that will ensure all children will have the best possible start in life. The study focuses on a broad range of outcomes. Being longitudinal, it examines developmental trajectories over time, tracking the development of two cohorts: approx. 11,000 infants (9 months old) tracking them into early childhood and approx. 8,500 children (9 years old) tracking them into early adolescence.</p> <p>The <b>Primary Caregiver Supplementary Questionnaire</b> for the Infant Cohort recorded information on a range of sensitive issues, such as marital relationship, marital conflict, fertility and pregnancy, experience of depression, feelings, drug use and any non-resident parents.</p>

<b>Unit of observation</b>	Study child, primary caregiver and the household
<b>Start date</b>	September 2008 (Wave 1, infants at 9 months)
<b>Completion date</b>	August 2011 (Wave 2, same infants at 3 years)
<b>Coverage</b>	<p>11,134 children, born between December 2007 and May 2008, were recruited to the Infant Cohort for Wave 1 data collection. The following relates to the Primary Caregiver Supplementary Questionnaire:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>» <b>Target population:</b> Primary caregiver of the Study child.</li> <li>» <b>Number of completed questionnaires:</b> 10,998 primary caregivers in respect of 11,134 Study children.</li> </ul>

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<b>Method of data collection</b>	The Primary Caregiver Supplementary Questionnaire was completed in respondent's home on a CASI (Computer Assisted Self Interviewing) basis.

<b>Internationally comparable data</b>	A British national longitudinal birth cohort study, conducted by the Centre for Longitudinal Studies and called <i>The Millennium Cohort Study</i> , has traced some 19,000 children born in the UK in 2000-01 throughout early childhood, with plans to continue tracing into adulthood. <b>Notes</b>	The Primary Caregiver Supplementary Questionnaire included the following standardised scales or measures: Seven-Item Short Form of the Dyadic Adjustment Scale (DAS-7) and the Centre for Epidemiological Studies Depression Scale (8-item).  In households where the Study child was a twin or triplet, the primary caregiver completed a 'Twin Module' questionnaire for the second and subsequent children, where only the child-related questions from the Primary Caregiver Main Questionnaire (see L 1) were asked. These 'Twin Module' questionnaires were completed on a PAPI (Paper and Pencil Personal Interviewing) basis.
